





OPEN Enhanced photocatalytic degradation of methylene blue dye using eco-friendly synthesized rGO@ZnO nanocomposites

Industrial chemical pollutants such as methylene blue (MB) dye are released into the water body and potentially cause harm to the human and aquatic biosphere. Therefore, this study aims to synthesize eco-friendly nanocatalysts, i.e., reduced graphene oxide (rGO), zinc oxide (ZnO), and reduced graphene oxide-zinc oxide (rGO@ZnO) nanocomposites, for efficient photocatalytic degradation of MB dye. A graphite rod was obtained from waste dry cell batteries for the electrochemical exfoliation synthesis of graphene oxide (GO) and rGO. For the eco-friendly synthesis of ZnO and rGO@ZnO nanocatalysts, Croton macrostachyus leaf extract was used as a reducing and capping agent. The synthesized nanocatalysts were characterized using a UV–Vis spectrophotometer, Fourier transform infrared spectroscopy, X-ray diffraction, and scanning electron microscopy with energy-dispersive X-ray. The eco-friendly synthesized rGO, ZnO, and rGO@ZnO nanocatalysts were applied for the photocatalytic degradation of MB dye using direct sunlight irradiation. At optimum parameters, photocatalytic degradation of MB dye efficiency reached up to 66%, 96.5%, and 99.0%, respectively. Furthermore, kinetics of the photodegradation reaction based on rGO, ZnO, and rGO@ZnO nanocatalysts follow pseudo-first-order with a rate constant of 2.16 × 10⁻³ min⁻¹, 4.97 × 10⁻³ min⁻¹, and 5.03 × 10⁻³ min⁻¹, respectively. Lastly, this study promotes a low catalyst load (20 mg) for the efficient photodegradation of MB dye.

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

ABSTRACT

ZnO nanorods having uniform size have been synthesized using hydrothermal method. Different standard analytical techniques were employed to investigate the microscopic structure and optical properties of the prepared sample. The formation of the hexagonal wurtzite structure of ZnO was established by XRD and SEM analyses. UV-visible spectra of the as-synthesized ZnO show absorption band edge in UV region at 373 nm, corresponding to which the calculated band gap of ZnO nanorods is found to be 3.4 eV. Photodegradation of methylene blue (MB) using ZnO as photocatalyst have also been studied. 
REPORT ON ONLINE WORKSHOP ON COMMUNICATION SKILLS AND INTERVIEW ETIQUETTE

The department of Social Work had organized blood donation camp on 14.06.2024 in collaboration with KR Hospital Blood Centre to observe World Blood Donor Day. The camp was set up in the PG centre MCA auditorium from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM.

Objectives

Objectives of the programme

- 3. To educate students on the importance of quick and effective responses to accidents and health crises.
- 4. To promote a culture of safety and preparedness within the student community.

Training Sessions Overview

Duration: The training programme spanned for 3 sessions on 5th, 6th and 8th of June. **Venue:** The sessions were held in the MTA Auditorium.

Participants: 300 postgraduate students from various departments participated in the training.

Session Content

The training sessions were comprehensive, covering a wide range of first aid topics

- Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR)
- Use of Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs)
- Choking relief for adults, children, and infants
- Treating burns and scalds
- Responding to poisoning and allergic reactions
- Recognizing and treating heart attacks and strokes
- Dog and snake bites
- Panic attacks in public

The first aid training sessions for PG students were a resounding success, fulfilling their objectives and providing invaluable skills to the participants. The positive feedback and observed outcomes highlight the importance of such initiatives. Moving forward, it is recommended to conduct regular refresher courses and extend training opportunities to a broader student population to foster a culture of preparedness and safety within the institution.





REPORT MOTHERHOOD- PCOD PCOS AND MENOPAUSE

The department of Social Work in collaboration with IWC of Mahajana PG centre and Motherhood hospitals had organized a programme for the women staff and students of the PG centre titled "Navigating the Journey through PCOD, PCOS, and Menopause – A Women's Health Awareness Programme"

Orientation Visit to Cancer Hospital by Social Work Students

On 27.06.2024II semester MSW students visited Bharat hospital institute of oncology for an orientation. This visit was organized to provide the students with firsthand experience and understanding of the role of social workers in a healthcare setting, particularly in a cancer hospital. The visit aimed to enhance the students' knowledge and prepare them for their future roles in social work within the medical field.

Objectives of the Visit

ORIENTATION VISIT TO DISTRICT CHILD PROTECTION UNIT



District child protection unit is responsible for coordinating and implementing all child rights and protection activities at district level. The DCPU function under the overall administration control and supervision of the concern district who is also the Co- chairperson of district child protection committee. On, 27/11/2023 at 2:00 from MSW department we had been to District child protection unit, Sarkari Balakara Mandira which is located in vijayanagar 4th stage, Mysuru. To understand what kind of children are under DCPU, either children conflict with law, child labor, orphans and child abuse and also to observe how physical or emotional care are being provided ,Psychological counseling and other basic materials like food and clothing services. It is a government institution where orphanages and juveniles are taken care it is a institution where only boys under 18 are under district child protection

unit.It works to help children adjust to the society. Speaking at the program, Mr. Raghu (program cocoordinator) explained, "Maharashtra government was the first to start a committee based on welfare of children who are forced into child labors child trafficking etc., in the year 1996. In the year 2006 the Commission for the protection of child right act was passed. Juvenile Justice Act 2015 2(35) (Care and Protection of Children) It was first assented in Bombay, it works 24×7."Counselor Miss Divya Kumari said that, "DCPU work all over the district. There will be 10 to 15 cases per day; children who are forcibly indulged in child marriage, child labor, orphans, child abuse will be taken under district child protection unit.Child welfare committee developed basic needs, care and protection to these children. Also special juvenile protection officer counseling for family members and children weekly three days:Monday,Wednesday and Friday .Also, discussed some cases of drug addiction under 18." Later District child Protection Officer Mr. Yogesh N.T. gave immense information. In the year 2012 Protection of child sexual offence (POCSO) started. In the year 1975 Development and protection of women and children act came into existence, there are 36 district child protection units all over the state. There are 38 child care institutions in Mysuru, where 3 child care institutions come under governmental organization and the rest 35 comes under non-governmental organization. Monthly 4000₹ scholarship will be given to single parenting and ₹1000 scholarship will be given to HIV patients.In his key note address, Mr. Mahendra from adoption centre explains the process of adoption like how it works. Adoption centre is open from 1-6 yrs of age. Children who are orphans and abounded can be taken for adoption .Those who are willing to adopt children should apply for CARA (central Adaption Resource). Maximum composite age of couples should be 75 to adopt 1 to 2 yrs old children Maximum composite age of couples should be 90 to adopt 2 to 4 yrs old children Maximum composite age of couples should be 75 to adopt 4 to 8 yrs old children Maximum composite age of couples should be 110 to adopt 8 to18 yrs old children.

The visit was definitely fruitful, where the social work trainees went with curiosity that was quenched and we came back with our mindful of knowledge based on experience and intelligence .The district child protection officer and other staff members were really kind and accommodative.

ORIENTATION VISIT TO BASAVAMARGA REHABILATION CENTRE





Drug rehabilitation is the process of medical or psychotherapeutic treatment for dependency on psychoactive substances such as alcohol, prescription drugs and street drugs such as cannabis, cocaine, and heroin. The general intent is to enable the patient to confront substances dependence. Treatment includes medication for depression or other disorders counseling by experts and sharing of experience with other addicts. On 28/11/23 around 3:00pm from department of social work, we had visited Basavamarga Rehabilitation centre . To know about the organizational and physical setup of the centre. Also to gain knowledge regarding treatment measures to patients with drug addiction. Mr. Manjunath working as counselor of the centre explained that, "They Aim towards providing all addicts so that they can develop their potential to the full. Additionally they work with the downtrodden people to promote equal rights and opportunities so that they can prosper in their lives". He continued explaining, that the "Basavamarga Foundation was registered in 2017 officially. The community has served the society since 1991 and currently manages multiple funds for individual family and foundation donors and local

nonprofit. In the last seven years they have been doing charity and de-addiction works in association with other charitable organizations. During its rich history of partnering with donors and the community,the foundation has earned an outstanding reputation for services,transparency and reliability. Mr. S Basvaraj was the founder and Mr. Prakash Prabhu is the trustee. Dr. Shashank is the psychiatry and Dr. Anand is the physician. There are 140 people who are admitted for 3 months. This is the spiritual programme for the Addicts. All the facilities are provided and there are co-curricular activities so that they can divert their mind and can indulged themselves.Gym facilities are provided and yoga trainer will teach yoga.He continued explaining "During Pandemic the School kids, teenagers were addicted to substances and had more cases compared to the time of pandemic. Counseling and therapies will be provided to the patients.The patients will get withdrawal symptoms after 3-4 hrs.Without medications they depend on 5D's to overcome:Deep breathing, Drinking water,Discuss,Diversion,Decision.They also took all of us to show the surrounding, infrastructure, facilities of the centre and end the session.

The visit to basavamarga Rehabilitation centre was very much useful for the trainees; they gained lots of informationabout this place and learnt how this organizationworks. Last but not the least to overcome any substances or habit of anything is a firm mind set of the particular individual.

ORIENTATION VISIT TO DISTRICT DISABILITY REHABILATION CENTRE



A District disability Rehabilitation centre is a specialized facility that provides comprehensive rehabilitation services to individuals with disabilities at the district level .These centers are typically established by the government and non-governmental organization to ensure that people with disabilities have access to essential rehabilitation services in their local communities.From the department of social work on 1/12/2023 around 11:00pm we all had visited to know the centre aims to address the physical, Psychological, social and vocational needs of people with disabilities and also to understand DDRC's offer range of services to cater to the diverse needs of individuals with disabilities. Speaking at the program, Nodal officer Arjun explained.About the government scheme in 2012 .There are 4 types of rehabilitation:-Education, Health sector, economical sector and social sector.In 1995 act, government granted provision only for 7types of disability:-Blindness, low vision, Leprosy, hearing impairment, locomotor disability, Mental Retardation and mental illness.Later in 2016, government, Locomotor disability, Dwarfism, Intellectual Disability ,Mental illness, Autism spectrum

disorder, Cerebral play, Muscular dystrophy, Chronic neurological conditions, Specific learning disabilities, Multiple sclerosis, Speech and language disability, Thalassemia, Hemophilia, Sickle cell disease, Multiple Disabilities including deaf-blindness, Acid attack victims, Parkinson Diseases. In this District Disability Rehabilitation centre which is located in Tilak Nagar, Mysuru. There are 25 staffs and 9 technical staffs.Comprehensive assessments are conducted to determine the specific needs, abilities and limitations of individuals with disabilities.DDRC's typically provide various types of therapies:-physiotherapy, occupational therapy, Speech and language therapy and Psychological therapy.These therapies Aim to improve physical,cognitive,communication and physiological functioning. They wheel also provide assisting devices, such as chairs, crutches, hearing aids, communication aids and other assistive technologies. These devices help individuals with disabilities to overcome barriers and improve their independence.DDRC's provide training programs to enhance the skills and capabilities of individuals with disabilities. He also continued saying, 'Emotional and Psychological support is provided to individuals with disabilities and their families through counseling services. This may include doctor, physiotherapist, occupational therapist, Speech and language therapists, occupational therapist, psychologist, social worker, vocational trainers and support staff.DDRC's typically collaborate with various stakeholders, including government agencies, nongovernmental organizations, local communities and other service providers. The funding for DDRC's may come from government source and non-governmental

organization, charitable donations. Some services provided at DDRC's may be subsidized or offered free of charge to ensure affordability for individuals with disabilities particularly those from economically disadvantaged backgrounds.

The visit to DDRC's was very helpful, where we all got to know that DDRC play a crucial role in providing essential rehabilitation services to individual with disabilities at the district level. They serve as a local Resource for comprehensive support, helping, individual with disabilities to overcome challenges improve their functional abilities and lead more fulfilling lives.

ORIENTATION VISIT TO CENTRAL RELIEF COMMITTEE AND NIRASHRITHARA PARIHARA KENDRA



Eradication of Beggary in the state ,the Maharaja of Mysore province his highness Sri Jayachamarajendra wodeyar bahadur formed a committee of higher officers in the year 1944 for study of Beggary in the state. On the basis of report of the committee decided to start Beggars Relief centre in Bengaluru. At the beginning the Beggars Relief centre was in the year 1946 in arentec building in Bengaluru. Later, in the year 1976 Nirashrithara parihara Kendra was started in Mysore near agrahara. From the department of social work on 1/12/23 we had been to Nirashrithara parihara Kendra. To know about the organizational setup and various facilities provided in the center. Mr. Ramesh works as a doctor in Nirashrithara Parihara Kendra .He explained, "The Karnataka prohibition of Beggary act 1975 has been enacted to prohibit Beggary in the state. However, any person above the age of 16 years male and above the age of 18 years female involved in begging will be arrested and after following such

procedures will be detained in the Beggars Relief centers for Rehabilitation. The Karnataka prohibition of beggary act 1975 and the Karnataka prohibition of Beggary is prohibited I the state .Central Relief committee and Relief centers are maintained by 3% Beggary levied on property tax on land and buildings by the local body authorities and remitted to the central Relief committee fund under section 31(1) of the Karnataka prohibition of Beggary act 1975. Dr.Ramesh gave detailed information about the facilities provide for the people like as follows:-

1. Everyday inmates are being served breakfast with coffee and tea and 2nutritious meals. Akshayapathra foundation of ISKCON is supplying food for the bengaluru centre. In addition to this, banana and eggs are being provided 3days per week respectively.

2. Bedding, soap, shampoo, oil, tooth brush, toothpaste, and powder etc.are provided to inmates of the centers and sanitary napkins to female inmates. Solar water heaters are installed 8n all the centers for hot water. For sports and other activities there is a playground in the bengaluru centre and outdoor gym equipments are installed, sports activities yoga, walking, activities are conducted for the in mates in all centers for hot water. For sports and outdoor gym equipments are installed, sports are installed, sports activities there is a playground in the bengaluru centre and outdoor gym equipments are installed, sports activities are installed, sports activities there is a playground in the bengaluru centre and outdoor gym equipments are installed, sports activities yoga walking activities are conducted for the inmates in all centre.

3. Medical facilities are being provided to inmates in all centers. For higher treatment inmates will be admitted to the nearest government hospital.

4.Vocational training are being imparted to the able bodied inmates in agriculture, horticulture animal husbandry,sheep,goat farming, tailoring,file wrappers making,phenol,etc.,household articles making and other vocational training to motivate them and for self-reliance as a part of rehabilitation of the beggars.During the training period /engaged in work inmates are provided with stipendiary daily wages.

5.Literacy activities are conducted in Relief centers to provide adult education, apart from these entertainment programs are conducted in open air, TV are provided in all centers for entertainments ,yoga , meditations etc,.

6. Infrastructure facilities like:-additional dormitories, mini health clinic, kitchen and dining hall,interval roads,barber shop,compound and water supply, drainage etc,. Works are undertaken in the centre in order to accommodate more number of Beggars and to provide better facilities.

7. Helpline no.10581 is provided to receive complaints from the public regarding Beggars nuisance

This visit was really good experience where the trainees got chance to know and learn about refugee home where any of the trainee didn't had any idea why and what kind of people stay in this organization.

ORIENTATION VISIT TO RURAL LITERACY HEALTH PROGRAMME (RLHP)



RLHP is a non -governmental organization working with an aim of comprehensive development of people living is slums and villages through a child centered integrated community development approach.On2/12/23 around 12:00pm from the department of social work we, had visited RHLP located in Mysore near Gayathripuram. Mr shashi kumar was the coordinator of the RHLP.He gave us detailed information regarding the centre .The coordinator started saying that Joy Maliekal founded RLHP, a non-governmental organization in Mysuru of Karnataka state in 1984 50 bring a change in the lives of the underprivileged, disadvantaged and deprived sections of the society.Joy spread awareness among slum dwellers and gave them a ray of hope for the betterment of their livelihood .Joy and his wife Philomena extensively worked for the cause of slum dwellers for several years .The director of RLHP is saraswati. The vision is to create free, equitable and sustainable society. The mission of the center is to empower the marginalized poor in slums and villages vulnerable children and other affected by natural calamities and climatic changes to respond to the challenges of growing poverty and human rights violations through collective and affirmative action leading to sustainable development, self reliance and economic independence. The evolution growth of RLHP's journey has passed through different phases of initial work extension, consolidation

and role transformation. RLHP is presently working in 8 districts mysore, chamrajnagara, chitradurga, Davanagere, Raichur, Bidar, Gulbarga of south and north Karnataka state ,covering more than 2,65,000 people.Human focused child centered and an integrated community development approach is the hall mark of organization. Projects conducted by RLHP:-

Child Development Programs

1.Rehabilation home for children :-Despite India's commitment towards eradication of child labor and street children there are reported incidents almost every day,of children being sexually abused,exploited,trafficking which is one of the monstrous evils that need to be eradicated.With an intension to extend a helping hand for the children those who are losing their rights and live in streets.RLHP initiated two rehabilitation homes named Ashakirana (ray of hope) in 1999 for girls .The Aim of this home is to provide a safe and healthy environment for children who are orphans or those who are in difficult circumstances. The integrated rehabilitation care includes food, shelter, lifestyles, education, yoga, meditation, counseling, good, sports computer, cultural activities. 2. Child rights group and federations:-child right group and federation Aim at the total development of the marginalized children from deprived sections.The prime focus was laid on improving the quality of education of children.

Regular meetings are conducted to prevent child labor, Child marriage, child abuse, and for improving the quality of education. Encouraging children's meaningfully participation and providing training on leadership are part of RLHP's intervention strategies.

4. Childline 1098:- childline. Is functioning 24/7 of 365 days for extending safe and secure environment for children who are in crisis.

5. Literacy Programme Reading for Transformation: - RLHP is initiated school library program in government schools, in both the urban and rural areas of Mysore. The essence is to support teaching. And learning, fostering, Readingculture and lifelong learning . The prime focus was to improve the reading habits of the children and to orient them with the power of knowledge and its relevance in their daily living. Makwana gram sabha aimed at the meaningful and active participation of children at community and school level supplementary education for children, to sustain children interest in education and to prevent drop outstanding child labor Women Development Protecting women from all kinds of exploitation and empowering their life with dignity, respect and equality is one of the primes concern if the existing women groups. Director of Don Bosco gave brief knowledge about Don-Bosco; His vision and mission for the poor and unaccompanied children and youth. Don Bosco was born on 16th August1815 in the turning Italy. He lost his father at the age of 2 his mother. Margaret accompanied him to realize his mission. He experienced the power of divine all through his life. His great desire is to spend his entire life working for the poor and a company children and youth. After his death in 1888, His students continued his mission today. His followers are working in one thirty two countries through a global network of eighteen seventy three centers reaching out to fifteen million children and youth. And further continued by saying about the projects like:-

Educational stream: - As there is a high dropout rate Add the secondary and PUC level of education due to various factors, and this can be checked through distant education. The above mentioned programme of Don boscomakkalalaya aims at reaching those who are left out of the formal education mode. The academic staffs in our institution teach and motivate these students to work hard and pass accessories and PUC so that the students can grow up with much more opportunities in life.

Skill training: - Don boscomakkalalaya initiated the Skill training program to enhance productivity proficiency and improbability of Youngsters. Components of the skill training programs are:-

1.Personality development: It is a part of our skill training programme. As it prepares, students to become effective leaders, better team players and it will help them to develop their social skills and express their thoughts with clarity.

2.Computer training: - Almost everything every job today and jobs of the future requires customs, computer literacy and operation skills

3.Spoken English: - It's a Skill Enhancement that allows students to broaden their world from job opportunities to expansion of one social network at work.

Basic Literacy Program: - It's an initiative by Don Bosco Makkalalayato improve students; research level for those who have not learnt to read, write and comprehend the basic text.
